SURREY POLICE REPORT by PCSO Jan Aldogan

I was wondering at the weekend as I walked around the green as to whether we should change the name of the West End Flower show to "Shower Show"? True to the British spirit, nothing was going to stop it from going ahead. I was overwhelmed at the enthusiasm of the stall holders and members of the public who came out to support another excellent show despite the rain. I was even more impressed to see people with many dogs that had been cleaned and tended to Crufts standards dodge the rain drops and shown in pristine condition.

I, however, didn't fare so well and I was soaked through to the skin, but like everyone else involved I wasn't going to let it get the better of me, but my hat has seen better days! Thankfully, apart from one little incident with a car and ditch the day appeared to get off incident free.

So to business... There is still a lot of thefts from motor vehicles in the West End beauty spot car parks which is giving me some concern. Patrols have been increased, but more importantly we need to educate all those who use them to take valuables with them or leave them at home. I ask anyone using the car parks to make sure that they do not have anything that may lure a potential thief to take action. Even coats, shopping bags, gym bags, cds in fact anything that could contain money or be sold is potentially a target. I must admit that I don't have the tidiest of back foot wells in my vehicle but anything of value is removed and taken home.

I was saddened to hear the news of the swans and as Rural Community Officer, I am impressed at the action that has been taken and pleased to hear that the cygnet and pen were taken away and looked after at the Swan Sanctuary. It was disgraceful that the dog was allowed to enter the pond because a dog swimming can disturb the natural pond life by digging up the silt at the bottom clouding the pond, and I will make it my place to visit the area regularly and talk to the dog walkers.

There have been other incidents with dogs that have been reported in the past of which I will discuss with the dog walkers as well. If you have anything you wish to discuss regarding this incident or any others, then please call the numbers opposite and talk to myself or Danny Bond.

WEST END SUMMER SHOW

The team of West End villagers who run the show were heartened by the support that fellow villagers and visitors beyond West End gave the show this year, both in their encouraging comments and by being there on the day. There were many more people in the marquee and on the green than we could have hoped for, given the unfortunate and awful weather conditions. One resident who has attended the Flower Show since its inception observed that 'it was the worst weather' he could remember.

If the weather was the bad news, the good news is that the Flower Show had 750 entries on display. This number is up by 15% on last year and is just short of our highest figure achieved in 2011. Thank you to all those who entered one or more classes, making the heart of the show a bumper year and a great success. The winner of the President's Perpetual Challenge Cup for the highest number of points scored in all classes was Irene Hobbs, and

the RHS Banksian Medal for the horticultural classes was Kate Carter. These and all other prizes were presented by Dominic Raab MP, a great supporter of our show.

Elsewhere on the green, through improvisation and cheerful faces (unlike the skies), the show remained open throughout the afternoon. The Dog Show Best in Show was won by Brax, a white Swiss Shepherd. Lucca Williams and Mia? (we don't have her surname, so please contact me to collect your cup!) won the Boy's and Girl's Sports Cups. The Arts and Crafts, the Classic Car display, Young's Horses Wagon Rides, Smash a Plate, Dunk the Damsel and all the other activities continued through the rain, while Matto the Clown and Punch and Judy still attracted crowds of enthralled children. The Epsom and Ewell Silver Band and an excellent choir from Stagecoach Dance and Drama came in from the wet and

performed inside the marquee to great acclaim.

One huge thank you from the organisers of the show to those villagers, families and friends who turned up on the day to help run the activities and stalls, set up tables and chairs, construct and deconstruct the awnings etc. Your support on the day was invaluable. And finally, a huge thank you from me to the Flower Show committee, a great team of dedicated and committed people who make the show happen – in any conditions, no matter what the weather cares to throw at them.

THE WEST END SWANS



AND THE SWAN SANCTUARY—SHEPPERTON

As you may know, tragically our beautiful Swans have once again been the victim of injuries and death this year. Following the loss of a cygnet which fell victim to a crow a few days after it had hatched, on Thursday 25th July the cob was viciously attacked and bitten by a mongrel cross Staffordshire bull terrier/ American terrier. The dog was not on a leash at the time and jumped into the pond to attack the Cob who tragically died from his injuries in the early hours on Sunday 29th July. There were a number of witnesses to the attack and one very brave man jumped into the pond to try and pull the dog away from the swan. Thanks to the quick thinking of one local resident, the owner's number plate was taken. The owner of the dog, who lives in the Shepperton area, was traced by the Surrey Police and was interviewed under Caution at the Police station. She admitted the behaviour of the dog and was Cautioned for Criminal Damage, which will remain on record. This is the first Caution of its kind by Surrey Police who were very pleased with the out-

A post-mortem was done on the Cob and he was found to have five dog bites, some of which punctured his airway. Members of the Police, RSPCA and the Swan Sanctuary arrived quickly on the scene and the very traumatised Pen and remaining cygnet were removed to the Swan Sanctuary where they are currently being cared for in the nursery.



Lynn Bezant and I visited the pen and cygnet (left) at the Swan Sanctuary to see how they were recovering and were given a very moving guided tour of the hospital and beautiful grounds. After the cob died the pen and cygnet were left

with him for two hours to enable them to come to terms with their loss. However, we are pleased to report that the pen and cygnet are both recovering well although the pen is still very traumatised and it will take long time before they both fully recover.

The picture above shows Dorothy (Dot) Beeson feeding our pen and cygnet (at the front right of the picture) in the nursery with other injured and orphaned cygnets. We were absolutely amazed at the wonderful work carried out by Dot and her three permanent members of staff and twelve volunteers. Dot started the sanctuary (which is the only one of its kind in the UK) 34 years ago on rented land at a site in Egham. Dot and her partner, Stephen Knight, were recently required to find a new site and purchased 25 acres by Shepperton Marina. The site includes a hospital, intensive care unit, incubation unit, a fully equipped operating theatre pools, nurseries and woodlands, to assist with the recovery of the injured birds. They admit over 1000 birds of all types very year with injuries ranging from dog bites, broken wings and legs, birds which have been abandoned and most distressing of all, those who have been deliberately

shot in the eyes, (leaving them with impaired sight). There are also birds suffering from fishing line injuries.

The Sanctuary has in the past few weeks received almost 100 swans which are being treated for Botulism. With the help of her daughter, a veterinary nurse, Dot and her team have been monitoring the swans on intravenous drips in intensive care overnight. 108 Swans have just been evacuated from Harrow Lodge, Hornchurch and another 35 have been moved to a safe lake, owing to a further outbreak of Botulism. There has been an outbreak of this deadly virus in lakes around the UK owing to the hot spell of weather where water has receded leaving silt in which the virus breeds.

All the birds were seriously ill and needed intensive care. There were two very sick swans in intensive care during our visit, one is making a good recovery the other is still in hospital with breathing problems. Dot and her staff have worked very hard for long hours to manage the number of sick birds being brought in, fortunately most make a remarkable recovery.

Many of the birds brought in to the Sanctuary have been rescued by the RSPCA, some have been left to the Sanctuary or just abandoned. As well as Swans, species include, ducklings, parrots, budgerigars, tropical birds of all varieties, owls, pea hens, a Jay who has been there for eight years and almost talks, and even seagulls! They are all given the same wonderful care.

Dot was awarded the British Empire Medal in 1990 for her work rescuing and treating swans on the River Thames and attended the Tea Party at Buckingham Palace that year. In 2000 she was honoured with the Lord Erskine Award one of the RSPCA's highest accolades in recognition of an important contribution in the field of animal welfare and the Daily Mirror Pride of Britain Award in 2001. Stephen Knight, her partner, was also honoured for rescuing 47 swans from an oil spill in Bedfordshire.

It is very costly to treat, feed and provide the medicines to manage the injuries of the birds. Over one ton of grain is used every 8 to 9 days, and over £1200 worth of lettuces and greens are provided each month. M&S, Sainsburys and Budgens provide the Sanctuary with out-of-date bread.

There is a well equipped visitor centre. Tour parties of up to a maximum of 50 can be arranged by appointment only. The Sanctuary is a Charity and relies on donations and sponsorship to help provide care for the injured birds. A TRIBUTE TO RODNEY IRETON CARSWELL HEWETT

7 November 1932—14 June 2013

Rodney was born in Birmingham, the first of two sons to Peggy and Ray. The family moved to London, Hinchley Wood then on to Ember Lane, Esher.

Rodney was sent to the Senior School at Ardingly College where he enjoyed himself and made life-long friendships. He survived without undue demands on the academic side of school life. He was, however, in the School Boxing Team and the Soccer XI. He loved his sport which he continued during his two years of National Service in the Royal Artillery.

After leaving School he played soccer for the Old Ardinians team in the competitive inter-schools Arthur Dunn Cup. He also played for the Corinthian Casuals and remained a keen supporter at their ground in Tolworth. He had numerous jobs including Trainee Salesman with a Wine Merchants, Tyre Suppliers, Fashion House etc. etc. He always said he could never rise above the trainee level. Eventually he joined the Personnel Department of the Steel Company of Wales which later became British Steel and was very happy negotiating with the Unions on behalf of the Company.

He retired early and took a retraining course at Merrist Wood Horticultural College and put this newly acquired knowledge to good use in our own garden at White Walls.

His interest in sport never waned. He played club cricket over the years for Oxshott, Esher and Thames Ditton.





Our next film season starts in the Village Hall on 15th September. For those who haven't been to West End Films before, we screen a mixture of art-house, classic and foreign language films in two seasons each year, between September and May.



The best film of last season was the beautiful and elegiac Ten Canoes, a story within a fable within a myth, set in the aboriginal tribal lands of the Northern Territories. Other films included a drama about the conflict between Danton and Robespierre that led them both to the guillotine, two contrasting films from South America and a biopic about a band of disabled Congolese musicians.

The new season includes $\tilde{\text{films}}$ from Ireland, Russia, France and Poland. The season



starts with **Intouchables**, a wonderful French film based on the true story of a Parisian quadriplegic aristocrat who hires an ex convict as his carer – the film is moving, thought-provoking and at times hilarious.
