In July Garden Historian Cherill Sands treated members to a very interesting talk on some of the follies to be found in this country. They heard about the oldest folly Freston Tower circa 1549 or 1578 to be found near Ipswich and the highest Hull's Tower to be found at Leith Hill in Surrey on the highest point of SE England. The hill and tower reach a height of 1000ft above sea level.

Some of the follies mentioned are to be found in the Landscape gardens such as Stourhead, Wiltshire: Stowe, Bucks: Croome Court Worcs; Kew Gardens and Painshill at Cobham. Several members had a day out in London in July. Having taken the train to Waterloo they then made their way to Hampstead Heath by bus. They walked through the Park and after getting lost several times and asking several dog walkers for directions they eventually found themselves at Kenwood house. They had an interesting tour of the house especially the library, recently restored in the Adam style. As all were faint hearted at the prospect of walking back through the park and getting lost again, the decision was taken to try and find the way back to Waterloo by bus. With the help of friendly bus drivers and two bus rides they arrived at the station to take the train home. NEWS FROM WEST END ESHER WI

We have enjoyed rewarding meetings and some members visited other WIs, including the Cedar Club where we listened to a very interesting talk from the grandson of a Titanic survivor. We also went to Denbies Vineyard where the weather was warm and sunny, so, in addition to lunch, browsing round the shop, some went on a train ride round the vineyard. It was good to sit and admire the view over the Downs.

In June our speaker was Victoria Helstrip who told us about travelling round India by herself. She recounted many anecdotes including the Indians' fascination with her white hair. The first thing she noticed was the mingled aroma of petrol fumes and different spices that assailed her. She brought some Indian clothes with her and demonstrated the correct way to wear a sari. She visited villages travelling in a rickshaw and told of too many people with too much time and not enough money, schools with very little equipment, even one where the teacher had left, but the children were still interested.

In July Liam O'Carroll recounted the obstacles encountered by a blind person on a daily basis such as bollards in the middle of a pathway, overhanging trees, differentiating between different denominations of paper money (solved by only carrying £5 notes). He recounted some amusing experiences like being asked whether his cane was a metal detector. In spite of being blind Liam has an MA in Arthurian literature. He showed a very positive outlook on life and no trace of self-pity.

In August we always have a social afternoon, this year enhanced by eight visitors from other WIs. It was good to chat to friends and hear news and views of ladies from other WIs. This was accompanied by music provided by Joy Osborne who entertained us with songs, piano playing and anecdotes – she also welcomed requests from the audience. We even had an impromptu Greek dance from a few members! During the entertainment we consumed tea and sandwiches, cakes & nibbles.



100th ANNIVERSARY OF THE GREAT WAR 1914-1918

FOUR BROTHERS WHO SERVED IN THE GREAT WAR

Pte Tom Smith (my grandfather) and Pte William Smith were two of the four brothers referred to in the above letter received by their mother, Mrs Thomas (Elizabeth Emma) Smith. The letter from the King signed by the Keeper of the Privy Purse, Buckingham Palace, SW, dated 26 May 1915 conveys His Majesty's appreciation of the patriotic spirit which has prompted her four sons to give their services to the Army.

Sadly, William Smith who served in the 1st/1st Bucks Bn., Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry was killed in action on Friday 7th May 1915 aged 20. William is buried in Ploegsteert Wood Military Cemetery 12 miles south of Ypres - (known as Plugstreet Wood). William was killed close to where he now rests. There is an inscription at the bottom of his grave, which is rare and

was probably requested by his mother. He was just 100 metres from the German front line and had only been in Belgium for three weeks when he was shot by a German sniper. The letter to the right, from the Territorial Force Record Office, refers to Pte.Tom Smith who was injured in battle and was admitted to 2nd Southern General Hospital in Bristol on 6th June 1915. The other two, Charlie Smith, (right) a musician, who served in 'C' Squadron 5th Princess Charlotte of Wales Dragoon Guards and Arthur Smith who I believe also served in the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry.


I have visited William's grave at Plugstreet Wood and it is a quiet, peaceful and almost eerie setting now, far removed from the horrors of the day when William and many others like him died.

They will always be remembered for their bravery and dedication to their country.

60th ANNIVERSARY WEST END SUMMER SHOW

What a great success the 60th anniversary of the West End Summer Show was, no matter what measures we care to use. The most important is, of course, the real pleasure, fun and joy showing on everyone's faces. Feedback received from many people has been extremely positive and this is inspiring and heartening for the team who put the show together. This truly is what the show is all about. Dare say, the perfect weather conditions helped create this happy spirit, no more so than with committee members themselves, relieved that the foul weather of the last two years did not reappear this year.

Wherever you looked, every activity on the green was being actively supported, with crowds of families and friends fully engaged as onlookers. The dog show was three or four deep in spectators, whilst entries were the highest for some years. The sports races were the same with a noise level not experienced in recent times. Winner of the girls' junior sports trophy was Lucy Reynolds whilst the boys' trophy was won by Theo Smith. The tug o' war between a team from Garsons and a village team called 'As Light as a Feather' was the best I have ever seen on the green with the village team just winning out in front of a raucous crowd. The new pony rides proved a great success with children, as did Punch and Judy and Matto the Clown. Plus Smash a Plate had record takings. And, all to the wonderful music of the Silver Band.

The heart of the show, the Flower Show itself, had over 700 entries and was so popular with visitors that it also had the best takings on the door in years. With the magnificent flower displays, the inside of the marquee was a real kaleidoscope of colour. Winner of the President's Perpetual Challenge Cup for the highest points in all classes was Irene Hobbs, whilst one of Bob Waller's many prizes was the National Vegetable Society Medal for the most meritorious vegetable exhibit in the show. Prizes were presented by our President Mrs Eileen Pocklington and Ian Richardson did his usual excellent auctioneering, collecting £230. The Arts and Crafts side of the marquee was also very popular, with the largest display of paintings we have seen for some years.

I would like to give a public thanks to the various committee members who make this show possible. David Ford and his fantastic team who make the Flower Show exhibits come alive. Mirjam Veldhuizen and Ros Moysen for creating the Arts and Crafts fair, Grant Ferret for managing the complexity of all that appears outside of the marquee, Jo Flippance for organising the dog show whilst carrying soon to be born twins, (in 5 or 6 weeks' time), Robin Crane and helpers for dealing with the chaos that are the sports events. Darren Hewett for doing his usual great job in running the raffle and attracting £2350 worth of prizes from businesses in and around Esher and individuals in the village, plus all the wonderful helpers on the day who erected and dismantled the show. It was great to see so many teenagers and twentysomethings mucking in and helping those of us more mature in years. Yet again Alistair Joel and colleagues from Garsons were invaluable in their support both before and after the event.

The show is primarily about creating a fun and festive day for villagers and visitors to our beautiful setting. With the rains of the last two years, money had become tight. Although full figures are not yet available, Simon Battensby's efforts on sponsorship (with unconditional thanks to our sponsors), Darren Hewett's on the raffle, a very successful subscriptions round this year, as well higher takings on the day, have returned our funds to a more healthy state. We thank each villager who contributed monies to our collectors during June and July. It was a wonderful response and your generosity amounted to £2580, the highest amount we have collected. Many, many thanks indeed.

Whilst money is vital, the heart and the energy behind the show are those of the committee members. You will see from the advert on the front page that we are in need of new members. If you enjoyed the show this year, value its place in the life of our village, and would like to be part of extending the West End Summer Show into its 7th decade, then please come along to our next committee meeting on Sept 16th upstairs in the Sports and Social Club at 8.15pm, followed by wine and beer afterwards, and/or attend our AGM which is on Monday November 10th in the village hall at 8pm. 

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
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WEST END FILMS
