ELMBRIDGE NEW LOCAL PLAN

Following increased targets from national government, Elmbridge Borough Council has launched a consultation to develop a new local plan. The local target is now around 9000 housing units over the next 15 years, ie. about 600 per year across the borough. (The previous plan required some 230 per year) The consultation covers 5 options for the selection of sites for development. These can be viewed at www.elmbridge.gov.uk/localplan. Help in accessing this website is available at Esher library, and a hard copy of the planned options, with maps, is also available there. The consultations ends on 30 September.

WALTON ASTRONOMY GROUP



Should you happen across a small group of people setting up telescopes on the green in West End on a Thursday evening, the chances are you have stumbled across a meeting of WAGs. Not, as you may think, England's 'Wives and Girlfriends', but the Walton Astronomy Group who have adopted the village as our local meeting and observing point. We have been running for a number of years, starting out based at Esher Rugby Club, but now preferring the slightly darker skies and good Southern horizon to be found on the Green. We meet every month, normally on a Thursday and sometimes for special events such as the partial lunar eclipse which happened in July.

WAG is a motley crew of around 10 active members, with an ethos which is all about encouraging interest in the hobby for new starters and engaging in practical astronomy whether it is observing or imaging, rather than attending lectures to discuss the theory. If it is cloudy, then we still meet, but enjoy a pint in the Prince of Wales. We range in experience from complete newbies to old lags with 20 plus years in the hobby and have scopes anywhere from 2.5" up to 16" in diameter which are capable of showing amazing sights, particularly under dark skies. We do venture down to near Bignor on the South Downs every now and then to experience this, but it is a long trip which can be tough on the return at 2am so we often prefer the convenience of the village.

Being close to Heathrow and London, you might think that there would be little to see even from the relatively controlled lighting of West End, but that is far from the case. Other than the Moon, obviously, the planets Jupiter and Saturn can be clearly seen currently, in fact if you look towards the South South West at around 8pm you will see a bright 'star', which is in fact Jupiter. With binoculars you should be able to see several of the moons which orbit around the planet. Saturn can also be seen as a fainter object due South. Through our telescopes, detail can be seen on the surface of Jupiter, and the lovely rings around Saturn are amazing sight to see, something you will not forget in a hurry.

Objects beyond our solar system can also be seen when the Moon is not lighting the skies. Within our galaxy there are exotic sounding objects such as globular clusters, basically huge balls of tens of thousands of stars, more delicate nebulae which are shells of gas thrown off aging stars, or clouds of dust and gas in star forming regions. Further away are the galaxies, millions of light years away, but visible through our scopes. We are also fortunate enough to have two members who have night vision equipment which allows incredible views of these distant objects in spite of the light pollution.

So, whether you are winding your way back across the green from the cricket club after a few pints, or taking the dog

out for an evening walk, please do come and say hello, and have a look through the scopes. We will be only too happy to show you whatever we happen to be looking at and have a chat.

THE RARE STARFRUIT RETURNS!



The starfruit was last seen in 2014, and the good news is that although it was in quite a vulnerable place it has successfully completed its life cycle and set seed which hopefully will result in more Damasonium in the future.

The other news is that soon we will have our forestry contractors back (around mid September) to continue the woodland management over the Horseshoe Clump Area down to The Homewood. The extraction will initially be to Winterdown Road again.

Woodland Management Autumn 2019

This Autumn forestry contractors will be continuing their work on West End Common in the area outlined in red on the plan, woodland management will be within the southern part of West End Common with the extraction of the timber to Winterdown Road. This is the second year of thinning works across West End Common which will involve:

- Thinning 33% of the woodland canopy to improve light penetration
 Non-native/invasive species control such as Turkey Oak, Laurel and Rhododendron
- Creation and maintenance of rides and glades

The thinning of the woodland allows light in to benefit wildlife and amenity across West End Common. The work is part of the on-going Woodland Management programme across Elmbridge's Countryside Estate approved by the Forestry Commission and the Countryside Consultative Grun.

The works will be carried out during September to December 2019 and will require the temporary closure of areas and access during the







SAD ENDING FOR AN EGYPTIAN GOSLING

Caroline Pattenden of West End Lane, is very upset to have to report that one of the Eygptian geese (now known to be a gosling) was recently hit by a car and killed along West End Lane opposite the pond. Unfortunately the geese had crossed the road in search of food. The driver of the car involved failed to see the gosling walking back across the road.

The awful incident was reported to both Elmbridge Council and the Swan Sanctuary, but sadly someone unknown had thrown the dead bird into the pond. This was a despicable act and very distressing for all concerned to see such cruelty.

We urge drivers to please drive with care along both Winterdown Road and West End Lane and at the junction when turning into Winterdown Road. Discussions about the provision of 'Slow Down' signs have taken place in the past at previous Residents' Association meetings. Perhaps it is time for something to be done? In the interests of the safety, please also keep dogs on leads at all times when close to the wildlife and pond and do not encourage the wildlife to cross the road to feed them.

WEST END BRIDGE CLUB

Let the Spade suit do the spadework for you

Say your Right-Hand Opponent opens the bidding with "One Club", and you're looking at this hand:-



AQ10942

Y

9732

5 2

Your opponents are vulnerable, you are not. Would you bid with just 6 High Card Points in your hand? If you're thinking 'Of course not' this is a plea to make you think again.

You really can afford to be quite aggressive with your overcalls if your suit happens to be spades, Especially if the opposition bids Clubs,. Look what happens when you overcall the Club opening with One Spade, At one fell swoop you cut out your Left-Hand Opponent's responses of "One Diamond" and "One Heart". Your bid signals that you're not going to let them get away with an easy part-score. Spades being spades, they're going to have to bid at the two-level, if they want to bid a suit.

Your bid more than complies with the <u>Suit Quality Overcall Test</u> (SQOT), where you add the number of cards in your suit (you must have a minimum of 5) to the number of honours in that same suit. In this case, six plus three (A,Q,10). This allows you to bid up to the level of the total tricks you are trying for, i.e. 9. So, on the hand above, you could in fact bid a highly aggressive "3 Spades". Whether you adopt this pre-emptive approach or go for a quieter "One Spade" is a matter of style.

At the very least, your bid has indicated a good lead for your partner. She might have a singleton spade, which would do some fast damage. Or, if she had a few spades, say three, she could help you put up a Spade barrage. She knows you've got at least 5, she's got 3. That's at least 8 Spades between you. So she could 'bid to the level of the fit' and support you with "Two Spades".

Remember, that when your side has a fit, it's very likely your opponents do too, Looking at the singleton Heart in your hand, your opponents may well have a big Heart fit, Your side bidding Spades makes it harder for them to find this fit.


