Balfour Beatty the M25 developers have arranged for a couple of their suppliers to donate some new picnic benches, our old ones were falling apart so most welcome.






WEST END PLAYGROUP

WINTERDOWN COFFEE

The news is that the mobile café has just been granted planning permission (with no resident objections) to develop part of the main building Pavilion 1 changing rooms into a café including extended deck with retractable awning.

Now Proposed Green and Grey Belts

The new Government has made it clear that they will allow homes on the green belt on something that they are calling "Grey Belt". In July, the draft National Planning Policy Framework defined "grey belt" as, "land within the green belt that include previously developed areas and those that contribute only a little to the green belt's purpose. However, it excludes land with significant environmental importance". The government's definition of the grey belt includes land on the edge of existing settlements or roads, as well as old petrol stations, golf courses and car parks. Under the current rules it is very hard to build on the green belt and applicants need to demonstrate 'very special circumstances' to justify gaining planning permission. The green belt was established more than 70 years ago to limit the growth of large built-up areas and to stop towns eventually merging into one another. Under the government's new proposals, if a council's housing targets cannot be met then some existing green belt land will be re-designated as grey belt. This will be to free up land for the construction of new homes and the new rules will require half the dwellings built in the grey belt to be affordable homes. The government also says that brownfield sites (old industrial or already built-on land) is to be prioritised over the grey belt.

The Council for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE), passionate protectors of the green belt, have welcomed the brownfield site priority over green belt as their research has shown that there are enough 'shovel-ready' brownfield sites in the UK for 1.2 million new homes, which will make a significant contribution to the Government's goal of 1.5 million homes.

It will be up to individual councils to decide what will be designated as "grey belt" so EBC should still be able retain some degree of autonomy.



There were a few cancellations on Friday afternoon – including Dunk-the-Damsel sadly - and who could blame them?

Arriving at the marquee at 8am on Show day, the entries started pouring in and kept coming. The mood was upbeat - after all, shouldn't we be used to the British weather by now? The marquee was buzzing, the exhibits were stunning; and it was filling up nicely with the best number of entries since 2019 (pre-COVID), which lifted our spirits. It was great to see adults and children becoming more involved in exhibiting. There were also many more entries from our novice allotment holders.

However, peeking out of the marquee, the green still looked rather empty, as the fairground rides and stallholders gradually started to arrive. The Dog Show was quieter than usual but carried on brilliantly rain didn't seem to bother the pooches. We need to mention everyone else on the green too - the stallholders, charities, food vendors and the magnificent classic cars' display. 



French royalty and Claremont Odile Hughson starts Esher French

Odile Hughson starts Esher French Circle's new season with a talk on French King Louis Philippe's exile at Claremont



French history enthusiast Odile Hughson will tell the story of the exile of the Orleans family at the inaugural meeting of Esher French Circle's 2024-25 season on Wednesday 16 October. Her talk (in French) will start at 7.30pm in West End's village hall.

Following the first French revolution of 1789, members of the French royal family sought refuge in England and spent several periods in various royal palaces in and around Richmond – including Claremont, where Louis Philippe spent his later years until his death in August 1850.



Odile Hughson grew up in Marseilles but her family was originally from a part of Poland that is now in Ukraine. As a young woman, she moved to Scotland to teach, where she met her husband David. She is the author of *Royal Friendships*, a history that examines the lives of the French Royal Family of Orléans during their successive exiles in Britain from 1800.




The Orléans royal family in exile at Claremont House, 1850

THE BLOOD OF THE TYZACKS

Paul Tyzack started his glassworks in Stourbridge. He had six sons but he could not leave them all to work in the glass business. We find Benjamin had this bequest in his father Paul's will. He was left four houses but: **they must be kept in the blood of the Tyzacks forever.** This condition brought the bequest under the law of **De Donis Conditionalibus.** This prohibited the free sale of such "entailed" land, but Benjamin managed to sell such land. The levying of a fine broke the entail and allowed the sale to proceed. I tracked down a separate indenture in obscure Latin.



The above indenture consisted of the account of a fictitious court case I found in Hereford library. It imposed a fine. It was written in a difficult script. I was lucky to find I had a colleague whose wife worked in a London legal firm where they found a lady who could read this stuff.



Now back to our French connection where another branch of our family was still connected with property in Lorraine. Back to our French friend Raymond George who turned out to be a great sleuth and discovered all kinds of facts about the Tyzack family in France.

I think he was helped by a Master Assistant in the Université of Nancy, **named** Dr Gabriel Ladaique who was writing his doctorate on the

Window glass makers of the Vöge. As my family name was in the Duke's Lorraine **Charter of the Glassmakers of 1448**, this, was a great link. Raymond obtained a photocopy of the draft of this doctorate.

In 1994 I managed to sneak a copy. So now we had a lot of sources of family history. Raymond arranged dinner in this chateau which is on the front of Raymond's book: This version was built by Nicolas de Thysac and is called Lichecourt.

Nicolas de Thysac was the son of Jehan, the first builder of Lichecourt. He inherited the fief from his father. The agricultural and forest area around the estate and the strong house, became the nursery that gave an impetus to the glass industry of the area.

Raymond's book contains even a chapter entitled **Les Thysac: des Violents.** This is a collection of stories about murders committed by members of the family, as they all carried epées. (Swords). The reason for his finding these stories is that the archives contain lots of requests to the Duke for remission, (pardon). Most of them are described as accidents.

On a Raymond tour we found several remains of Tyzack buildings. One example was a glassworks in La Rochère built in Passavant in la Vöge. It was built by Simon Tyzack in 1496. Raymond took us there. When the then owner heard our name, he invited us to his house and opened a bottle of Champagne! It is incredible that after so long it is still functioning as a glassworks.

But as Raymond left the owner's house he spotted his favorite Escargots, (Snails). So they went straight into his pocket for his breakfast for the next day!


