

## NEWS FROM WEST END ESHER WI

We have enjoyed a successful couple of months including a visit to Polesden Lacey in September. We were very fortunate with the weather that day, so that we were able to stroll round the lovely grounds in warm sunshine as well as visiting the very interesting house.

We also had excellent visiting speakers. At our September meeting Andrea Cameron recounted her experience of becoming a Freeman of the City of London. First she gave us a short history of the Freemen, including the fact that the City of London has had its' own Lord Mayor since 1280. We heard about the lengthy process of becoming a Freeman. After a few years she was allowed to apply to be a Liveryman of the Stationers Company. This she achieved after several interviews and another wait. This was a very enlightening talk opening a window on an unfamiliar world,

In October Mary Forenza's talk was on women who have improved the lives of women in various ways. She commenced with Erin Pizzey, born in 1939, who opened the first refuge for abused women in Chiswick. She provided a safe place for the women and their children to escape violence. Now there are 500 refuge centres and this abuse has a much higher profile.

Her next subject was Caroline Norton, a Victorian, whose husband was violent. Married women had no rights to any property they owned or to their children. So when she left him, he refused her access to her children and she had no recourse in the law.

She campaigned against this and her courage was instrumental in the passing of the Infant Custody Act & The Marriage & Divorce Act. Mary chose Marie Stopes as the third woman who made our lives easier. She opened the first birth control clinic in Islington. She was reviled by a section of the community and accused of immorality, but her action enabled future generations to plan their families.

Her next choice, Coco Chanel, was a great contrast. She liberated women from the "corseted silhouette" when she opened her first dress shop in Paris and subsequently gave us many iconic fashions such as the little black dress, Rosa Parks, the next woman to make a difference, was an African American in Alabama who spoke out against segregation and its' unfair laws. The eventual result was that segregation was declared illegal. After her death her body was laid out under the dome of the White House.

The last woman was a white South African, Helen Suzman, who worked tirelessly to end apartheid. Some white South Africans did not appreciate this action!

New members will receive a warm welcome. We are a small very friendly W.I. We meet on the 3rd Wednesday of the month at West End Village Hall.

## 50 YEARS—A 'HERCULEAN' CAREER IN

# THE RAF PETER BEDFORD

After mentioning casually to Angie that I joined the Royal Air Force fifty years ago, on 4<sup>th</sup> October 1964, she persuaded me to jot down a few memories. Having been brought up in a flying environment (we lived at Dunsfold when my father Bill was Chief Test Pilot for Hawkers), my own flying career took off, literally, with the award of a flying scholarship through the school air cadets, enabling me to gain my Private Pilot's Licence by the

age of 17 (before my driving test – which I failed twice!).

Starting out as a Flight Cadet at the RAF College Cranwell was quite an experience, straight from school. You soon learned to get on with others and to knuckle down to the discipline, but two and a half years later we graduated with our "wings", and moved onto operational flying. In my case, that meant the C-130 Hercules (I used to say to my father, a fast-jet person, that there was no point in flying unless there was someone on board to cook you a good breakfast!). I started on the "Herc" at Fairford, in the late-60s, our role being low-level tactical and airdrop missions, as well as long-range transport flights, and we shared the airfield with Concorde prototype 002. An unexpected bonus was a short-notice 6-week detachment to command the RAF airstrip at Anguilla, in the Caribbean, over Christmas and New Year!

A flying instructor's course at RAF Little Rissington in the Cotswolds found a group of us obtaining an Ordnance Survey map and visiting every local occurrence of "PH" and "Inn", which perhaps explained why I was awarded the so-called "Top Hat Trophy", for the student coming bottom in ground-school! Then followed duty as a flying instructor back at Cranwell (when Prince Charles was going through the course), and on loan to the Singapore Air Force.

A return to the Hercules at RAF Lyneham in the late-70s included events such as flying the Bishop of Salisbury around the 2,000 square miles of his Diocese, operating with special forces in northern Norway, the affiliation of my Squadron (No 47) with Guinness at Park Royal, flying in support of the Red Arrows (once with my father on board), an exchange tour with the French Air Force (steak and red wine at top of climb – yes, really true), pioneering in 1982 the introduction of air-to-air refuelling in the Falklands War, leading the Hercules formation in the Battle of Britain 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary flypast over Buckingham Palace, hosting a discrete visit by the very young Princes William and Harry (the latter sitting on my knee in the flight simulator), and commanding the Air Transport Detachment at Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, during the First Gulf War in 1991.

All good things must come to an end, and in the early 90s I was moved to Brussels, as a "NATO-crat", working for the UK Delegation on behalf of the Chief of Defence Staff, dealing with a whole host of force planning and policy issues, whilst at the same time working on my golf handicap! This transitioned later into a civilian "politico-military advisor" post down at SHAPE near Mons, sometimes unkindly described as *Superior Holidays at Public Expense*! Retirement came finally in 2010, although sadly just after my mother Mary died.


I had a tremendous 34 years in the RAF, followed by 11 years as a NATO civilian working with the military. The Hercules force saw me into 72 countries and 257 airfields. I have flown my father, mother, wife and two sons – all on different occasions – sometimes even legally! We love living in West End, and I enjoy my role as President of the local Air Cadets at

Esher and Surbiton. As ever, it all boils down to people and camaraderie. Lastly, I want to put on record the fantastic support Naomi has given me, both professionally and socially, keeping me on the straight and narrow (by the way, she looks great in a flying suit!).

## THE ILLUSTRATED LONDON NEWS



This Memorial Number of the Illustrated London News dated 20 November 1920 was dedicated "To The Unknown Warrior". It follows the story of the British Unknown Warrior's body to his last rest accompanied by the King and his Princes, Admirals, Arch-Bishops and Ministers of State. He was brought from Ypres to Boulogne and then to London on 9th November Following the Remembrance Service at the Cenotaph on 11th November 1920 he was laid to rest in Westminster Abbey.

## FREEMASONRY IN WEST END

The recent 100 year anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War reminded us of the significance it had on Freemasonry and many of its members.

The Masonic Million Memorial Fund was set up in 1919 to raise the estimated £1 million required to rebuild Freemasons' Hall, the headquarters of the United Grand Lodge of England and the principal meeting place for Masonic Lodges in Central London. This was then rebuilt between 1927 and 1932 as a memorial to the 3,000 Freemasons who gave their lives serving their country in the 'Great War'. It is a superb example of the Art Deco architecture of that period. The end of the war saw a large rise in the number of freemasons and in the three years after the First World War over 350 new

Lodges were consecrated. In many cases the founders were servicemen who wanted

to continue the camaraderie they had built up during their war service, and were looking for a platform to continue and enhance their friendships in a rapidly changing world.

Our own Lodge, Ember Manor which meets in West End Village Hall was consecrated in 1925 so next year we look forward to celebrating our 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary. We had an enforced break over the summer recess as we hold our regular Lodge meetings in October, January, March and May. However, we did hold an August summer garden party hosted by our current Master John Parker, which proved very successful and was blessed with fine weather.

At our regular meeting in October we held an 'Open' festive board where non-Masonic guests were invited to join us for dinner and experience something of how 'freemasonry works in the community'. At the festive board two cheques, each for £650 were presented to two local charities East Elmbridge Food Bank and Byfleet Care and at the meeting itself £1,000 was pledged to support local Alzheimer's Support groups in Walton and New Haw.

Freemasonry means different things to each of those who become members but for most, it is essentially an extremely social and enjoyable hobby which provides an opportunity to meet up with like minded individuals. As part of our ritual states 'we have but one aim in view to please each other and to unite in the grand design of being happy and communicating happiness'.

## WEST END RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION

A quick update re parking. There has been a minor development in respect of the parking on West End Lane. Typically Surrey have not consulted WERA on this issue but from the relevant website it is apparent that their proposal is to merely mark additional double yellow lines on the south side of the Hospice entrance. This change will no doubt be welcomed by residents as it resolves a chicane problem which Surrey created when they installed the existing yellow lines. There is nothing on the website to indicate any change outside Talbot Lodge.

WERA are still awaiting proposals from Elmbridge Council which would help to improve the West End Lane parking situation by increasing the parking space on the Recreation Ground site.


