UNAUTHORISED ENCAMPMENTS

Following our previous article in the summer

newsletter, 'Living With In' has reported that Elmbridge has been granted a protective injunction banning setting up of unauthorised encampments and fly-tipping. The injunction granted at the High Court, covers more than 150 of the borough's parks, open spaces and car parks. This has been granted as an interim injunction with a view to returning to the High Court in November to seek a longer term injunction.

This year has seen an unprecedented increase in levels of unauthorised encampments, totalling 27 on public parks and open spaces as well as other recent encampments on private owned land such as Painshill Park. The size of the encampments have also risen dramatically with some being over 60 vehicles in size.

DIG FOR VICTORY

Before the 1939/1945 war Britain imported 70% of its food but because we were cut off from our overseas supplies during that period home agricultural production grew by 35%. Farmers increased the number of acres under cultivation from 12,000,000 to 18,000,000 – so the statisticians tell us. Everybody was encouraged to 'Dig for Victory' so not only did farmers bring more land into cultivation but there were more allotments holders and flower beds in gardens were turned into potato patches.

Some of that extra land brought into production was on West End Common, part on what is now again a sports field but the rest was the area where the Local Authority are now harvesting oak trees. It is hard to imagine the area opposite to the entrance to Garsons and the area outside Winterhouse Farm near to the stables (just below the cross on the photo) being a ploughed field, but it was.

You can see it in the aerial photograph of 1947 there is not an oak tree in sight and while the area had already been abandoned, it is very poor soil, the outline is clearly visible. I suppose the abandoned ploughed area was ideal for the planting of acorns, presumably by the wild life from the hedgerow oaks, of which there were many.



It is also hard to imagine just how open West End Common was in 1945, it was heath land not a mini forest. It is pleasing to see some of the area restored to heath land which should bring with it a greater range of plants and animals that were smothered by the invasion of the trees.

There are lots of figures banded about relating to how much food now consumed in the UK is produced at home, the NFU claims it is 61% - so it would seem that we import only 39%. This seems better than the pre-war figure but another source claims that we imports 48% of the total food consumed and the proportion is rising. As the Victorian British Prime Minister Benjamin Disraeli is alleged to have said "There are three kinds of lies: lies, damned lies, and statistics". Still we at Garson are doing our bit to feed the Nation and reduce our reliance on imports with our PYO production but the situation would have been catastrophic before we again tried to cultivate the Common.

THE DOG POO PROBLEM



It is a problem which is spoiling the pleasure of many of us living in the village, as well as the natural beauty of the area.

Worst of all, it is very often left on both the football and cricket pitches where children play. Bins are provided so please use them. I know that most local residents' are very particular and the majority are not responsible for this, but it is shameful and inconsiderate of those dog owners who don't clear up after their dogs, especially where small children from the Playgroup walk and junior footballers and cricketers play. It is simply inexcusable behaviour.

PLÉASE BE MÓRE CONSIDERATE WHEN WALKING DOGS.
REMEMBER: If children are infected by Toxoplasmosis this can be a serious health hazard.

HEDGEHOGS



During the hot weather on Sunday 29th July, a small hoglet was seen sitting in the middle of a garden lawn in Winterdown Road in the intense heat of the sun. It hadn't moved for some time and was rescued and taken to Leatherhead Wildlife Rescue Centre that evening. He was examined by the vet the following day only to find one leg was missing and the other was badly fractured and regrettably he had to be put down. A sad end to this little creature. The Wildlife Rescue Centre confirmed that very often garden strimmers are the cause of hedgehog injuries as was suspected in this case.

Hedgehogs are protected under the Wildlife & Countryside Act in Britain. Hedgehog spines come out when it sheds its baby spines and replaces them with adult spines, this is called 'quilling'. They build nests of moss and leaves under vegetation around parks, gardens and farmland. They prefer woodland edges, hedgerows and suburban gardens. They feed on insects, snails, mushrooms, grass roots etc. their favourite food is slugs and worms and are a very good form of pest control in the garden. The male is called a Boar and the female is called a Sow. They hibernate from November to April. They have 5 toes on their front paws with short nails and 4 toes with long nails on their back paws. Woodland hedgehogs have a lifespan of 2-5 years and can produce up to six young in a litter. They can swim and sprint up to 6 miles per hour. Sadly numbers are declining through loss of habitat.

So please be aware in the Spring and Summer when cutting your grass verges just take a minute to stop and think, you too might just have a hedgehog or hoglet sheltering in your garden!



WEST END BRIDGE CLUB

This is a HOLD-UP!

Some people like to play No-Trumps, others distrust them. However, both camps have to acknowledge the brilliancy of the person who suggested the first No-Trump trick should be worth 40 points, thereby allowing us all to make a game with only 9 tricks, as against 10 for major suits, and a stratospheric 11 for minors.

The technique of making a Hold-Up play is particularly relevant in No-Trump contracts. Here South is playing 3 No Trumps, and this is the Club Suit...



West's opening lead is the 4 of Clubs, the fourth best of his longest suit, getting in the first blow in the battle to establish his Clubs. Clearly it would be fatal for Declarer to play his Ace of Clubs immediately. As soon as East got in with, say, the Ace of Diamonds, he would still have a Club to lead over to West, who will cash his four Clubs. Result: One down.

So you must hold-up your Ace until East is exhausted of Clubs, but how many times do you need to do this? Luckily there is a very simple rule to guide you — the Rule of Seven. When you've got one sure stopper in the suit led to your No-Trump contract, all you do is add the number of cards you hold in that suit as Declarer to the number Dummy holds (in this case, 3+2=5), and subtract that number from 7 (7 - 5 = 2). Therefore you should hold up your Ace of Clubs twice.

Now look what happens in the case above:-

1st Trick: 4,6,J,5. 2nd Trick: 9,10,Q,7. 3rd Trick: 8, discard, 3,

East has been shorn of Clubs to return to West's winning K,2. East is no longer the 'Danger Hand'. You need to take your finesses through West to increase your chances of making your contract.

Notes. A. The Rule of 7 is not really a hard-and-fast rule, more a guideline. B. Also, don't overdo the hold-up play. After notching up one or two tricks, the opponents may turn their attention elsewhere.




