



ST GEORGE'S CHURCH, WEST END

Gradually we have begun to resume "Normal Services". When we re-opened in July, we were obliged to seat people suitably spaced apart – with a maximum of abut 15-20 people in the church at one time which meant booking people in and allocating seats. Thank goodness things have improved. We continue to be cautious and so ask everyone to wear a mask, which in a small church is advisable, especially now that we are all able to be singing hymns again! But we are so pleased to be able to now welcome whoever turns up on a Sunday morning. Christmas services will be minimal this year (see below for the service schedule) as the church would need to be cleaned between each service, so for this year we will only be holding the Christmas Morning Eucharist at 9am.

There will be a Crib Service at Christ Church – so do go there with your children and families – and we hope to resume ours next year. Unfortunately for the same reasons the Village Carol Concert has been postponed – but again, we very much hope that by this time next year our busy Christmas schedule will be re-instated. The good news however is that from January 2022 we will be holding our 9am services EVERY Sunday – and we look forward to you coming along to join us. Many of us have been following the service with coffee in the Sports and Social Club afterwards – you may have seen us take over the tables!



Talking of Christmas – we have produced a lovely Christmas Card which you may have seen. Two versions of the same card - one with a caption and one plain. They are sold in packs of 10 (same card) for £5. Profits will go towards St George's renovations. Contact Andrea or Bridget – or available from the Parish Office (details at the bottom of the page).

The roof was repaired last year – but renovations that are in the pipeline are: exterior painting (which will need the old paint removing first), a leak from the "bell" tower, checking the electrics and possible rewiring, and the floor needs checking out and then replaced with hopefully a "wood" laminate finish. We will be seriously fund raising for all this work – but in the meantime we are so very grateful to have had an amazing bequest from Richard Gale who, as many of you will know, lived in the village opposite the pond. These bequests are so vital to the upkeep of our local landmarks, so when we receive one we are always touched by people's thoughtful generosity.



Coffee Morning at St. George's

Christ Church and the PCC have recently launched a "Friends...." And you will see more about this in our Christmas Card pamphlet that will be being delivered to your home.

We have already started the "coffee mornings" and they will be held between 10.30-11.30 on the 2^{nd} Wednesday of the month., alternating between Christ Church and St George's.

We held our first "Friends" coffee mornings at St George's West End on Wednesday 13th October and Wednesday 10th November. We were offering coffee tea and cakes to anyone who wanted to join us, and on each occasion we were delighted to have about 12-13 people in total all of whom enjoyed the freshly brewed coffee and home baked cakes.

It was a delight to welcome a mix of congregations from both CC and West End – and actually manage to have a good conversation, something we don't often



have the chance to do after the services at the back of the church!

We even had a passer-by pop in for a take away coffee. Everyone is welcome, so do drop in – keep your eyes open for the banner on the fence reminding you of the dates.

Although it was our 13th annual Pet Service on Sunday 17th October (we missed last year due to Covid) – it was a first for Darren. Until now they have all been held at St George's in West End, but this year it was temporarily re-located to Christ Church. For the safety of owners as well as pets (again due to Covid restrictions) -we decided that **as** Christ Church is much bigger, we could space people and animals at a sensible distance and also use separate doors to enter and exit. Fortunately there is ample parking and the green opposite was well placed for a pre-service "comfort break" for the doggies!

Darren made some lovely changes to the service this year and we were supported with some very appropriate music and hymns chosen and played by Stuart.

There were around 30 people in the congregation – but the key participants were 8 dogs, 2 cats and a rabbit, a few photographs of pets that were unable to attend....and a pet soft-toy snake! One cat was safely housed in it's "carrier" - and the other was snuggled around it's owner's neck for the duration of the service! The service was joyful – and all the animals were extremely well behaved – and we are pleased to report that there were no "accidents". Darren spent time moving around the church and blessing each one individually. All the animals are always offered suitably chosen "treats" as they leave – in the hope that they will remember the experience and want to come again next year. Meanwhile all the "owners" were given a special laminated prayer card to take home and use as a prompt to remind us of how grateful we all are for the joy of having a

COVID-19 NEW VARIANT (OMICRON) UPDATE

A new COVID variant spreading through southern African countries is causing a great deal of concern worldwide. Cases have been identified in South Africa, Holland, Botswana, Belgium, Hong Kong, Israel and the UK. The Government has acted quickly adding 10 countries to the red list, banning flights to and from South Africa and surrounding countries. Arrivals in UK will be required to quarantine for 10 days. Face masks will once again be compulsory both in shops and on public transport. The variant - called B.1.1.529 - has a "very unusual constellation" of mutations, which is very alarming because they could help it evade the body's immune response and make it more transmissible.

Europe is experiencing a serious increase in Covid infections. Austria, Holland and Germany and many other countries have recently confirmed cases leading to further lockdowns and travel bans. Thousands of demonstrators protesting against restrictions both in the UK and Europe and are being influenced by misinformation circulating on the internet. Many refuse to be vaccinated. Controversial Vaccine Passports have been introduced in Scotland for large events and other countries are also considering introducing these. In the UK the (third dose) or Covid booster and Flu vaccinations are being rolled out at speed and people are being urged to come forward for vaccination.

At the time of going to print, confirmed Covid cases in UK have reached over 9.97m and in excess of 144k deaths have been recorded. Over 46k people have received the second dose and 16k have had the booster. In the meantime stay safe and heed the Government's latest advice: In the interests of everyone's health and well being please get vaccinated as soon as you can!

the past few months and they said how pleased they were to be able to visit the WIs in person again.






